# WOMACK LEASES IOLA AIR FIELD

## Local Jenny Pilot To Con- duct Airport After March 15

Under the terms of a deal an- nounced today F. W. Womack, 706 South Buckeye, will take over com- plete control of the Iola airport March 15. Mr. Womack has leased the air field from the owner, Ernest Bergman for one year, and will op- erate it for profit.

Mr. Womack, who owns and pilots a Curtiss Jenny, has been field man- ager at the airport for nearly two years. As operator he intends to continue giving flying instruction as he has in the past.

No radical changes in the meth- ods of operating the field are con- templated, Mr. Womack said today. The eight planes now permanently housed there will receive the same field and hangar service after March 15 as before.

New improvements at the field in- clude the partial filling in of the gully which bisected the 47 1/2-acre field making landing and taking off somewhat inconvenient in the past. The north end of the gully for 200 feet already has been nearly filled, and, when completely filled will give the field a new runway stretch- ing a quarter of a mile east from the large hangar. Considerable work including rollin, remains to be done on the filling project.

Ross Arbuckle, owner and pilot of an American Eagle biplane, has leased a plot of ground south of the large hangar upon which he will construct a small private building for housing his plane.

The Curtiss Jenny purchased by Jack Craven several months ago and knocked down for overhauling will be in the air by next Sunday if work now in progress continues at the present rate. The plane was virtually rebuilt by Pilots Womack and Craven, and will be the same as new when the work on it is finished.

Mr. Craven is devoting all his time this week to getting the plane in shape for a test flight next Sunday.

## Baptist Team Will Play Three Games

Indianapolis, Mar. 1. (AP)—The United Mine Workers of America, at the opening session today of their thirty-first convention here, unanimously adopted a resolution legalizing and ratifying the consti- tution and the procedure taken two years ago in extending the consti- tution by a referendum vote.

The resolution was the significant action of the opening session, refuting the contention on which fac- tional elements called a rump con- vention, to meet in Springfield, Ill., today. The rump convention miners hold that the constitution expired March 31, 1929, when no conven- tion was called to renew it, and that the international organization is without power.

Through today's resolution, the international convention goes on record as endorsing the overwhelm- ing majority accorded in the refer- endum of two years ago extending the constitution until it is renewed.

Continued support of John L. Lewis, international president, was indicated when the delegates, num- bering more than a thousand, gave him a long ovation when he stepped forward to take the gavel.
